St. Bernard's College

On 20 August 1940, the feast of St Bernard of Clairvaux, 224 boys from Years 7 to 11 carried their desks from St Monica's across the park to a new school on The Strand in Moonee Ponds. Under the leadership of Brother J. K. Creagan, St Bernard's College was born. In 1963, classes commenced on the current campus in West Essendon in the Tobin Building. Soon after, the Brothers' residence was added and the site has been steadily developed to include innovative teaching spaces, the 370 seat Frank FitzGerald Auditorium, a creative Arts and Technology Centre, the O'Brien Sports Centre, a Swimming Pool and most recently the Marian Chapel and Staff Centre. As part of their journey through St Bernard's College our students experience a rich differentiated curriculum at the pivotal Year 9 stage. Soon to be situated at the recently acquired Resurrection House Campus site, our Year 9 students also attend the Santa Monica Outdoor Education Camp situated west of Airies Inlet on the Great Ocean Road and our Urban Experience centre in Melbourne's CBD. A senior studies building (Year 11 & Year 12) is soon to follow in 2023.

Students at St Bernard's are expected to be personally enthusiastic about involving themselves in the broad spectrum of educational opportunities offered by the school. This applies especially to an informed and active appreciation of their Faith as an integral and essential part of a holistic education. There is no selective academic entrance exam. The school motto Discere et Agere — To Learn and To Do - underpins a strong drive for all students to achieve their personal best in whatever pathway is most suited to their interests and capabilities. Most students choose a VCE pathway to university, but a significant number also enroll in VET, vocational major and the SBC Baccalaureate courses in Years 11 and 12.

As we progress through the next Chapter of our proud history as a College, inspired by the Charism of the Blessed Edmund Rice, we present the Strategic Plan 2022-2026. Informed by our history and those who came before us and with a very clear vision of what we will need to do for our students, we commit ourselves to this plan so that each student may take their place as men for others in their lives beyond SBC.

We invite all people into the story of Jesus and strive to make his message of compassion, justice and peace a living reality within our community.




INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY






Commitment to our Faith
